Finalists in 5th Annual Transactional LawMeet Competition are Named

Philadelphia, March 4, 2014. On Friday, February 28th, 2014, eighty-four teams competed in regional rounds of the 5th Annual Transactional LawMeet. The seven Regional LawMeets were hosted at Western New England University School of Law in Springfield, Massachusetts (New England Region); Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law at Yeshiva University in New York, New York (Mid-Atlantic Region); The University of Georgia School of Law in Athens, Georgia (Southeastern Region); Northwestern University School of Law in Chicago, Illinois (Chicago Region); University of Missouri -Kansas City School of Law in Kansas City, Missouri (Midwestern Region); South Texas College of Law in Houston, Texas (Southwestern Region); and UCLA School of Law in Los Angeles, California (Western Region). The competition asked law students to represent one of two sides in drafting and negotiating an indemnification agreement to address a royalty dispute that arose between the seller and a third party during an acquisition. The drafting stage took place over two months, with students drafting indemnification agreements, having interviews with their clients, and marking up opposing teams' drafts. The regional portion of the competition culminated with the live negotiations this past Friday, February 28th.

Two teams were selected from each regional round to compete in the National Rounds on April 3rd and 4th. The finalists from the Southeastern Region were Brooke Baird, Elizabeth Clippard, and Michael Crum from University of Tennessee College of Law and Bradley Steffen and Paige Rabe from Salmon P. Chase College of Law. Teams from each regional round were also recognized as Regional Semi-Finalists, although they do not advance to the National Rounds. The semi-finalists from the Southeastern Region were Andy Shin and Taylor Wilson from The University of Georgia School of Law and Benjamin Smyser, Jili Xue, and Marcus Brown from Emory University School of Law. In addition to finalists and semi-finalists in the negotiations, teams from each region were recognized for their drafting skills. Winners of the Best Draft award from the Southeastern Region were Bentley Adams and Irena Chernova from Atlanta's John Marshall Law School and Benjamin Smyser, Jili Xue, and Marcus Brown from Emory University School of Law.

The fourteen Finalist teams will be competing at the National Rounds of the competition on Thursday, April 3rd and Friday, April 4th. The National Rounds will be held at Sullivan & Cromwell LLP's New York office. Judges for the National Round include Aaron Holmes (Accenture); Andrew Kaufman (Kirkland & Ellis LLP); Andrew Muratore (Pfizer Inc.); Charles Middleton (Oxbow Corporation); Don Liu (Xerox); Ellen Grady (Safeguard); Karl Klib (Bloomberg L.P.'s former counsel); Stephen Kotran (Sullivan & Cromwell LLP); and Tasha Hutchins (Practical Law).

He organized the first Transactional LawMeet, with 11 participating teams, in 2010. Next year, LawMeets organized the 5th Annual Transactional LawMeet, with 84 participating teams. In 2011, LawMeets added the Intellectual Property LawMeet, which began with 12 participating teams and will now be in its fourth year with at least 24 teams.
