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GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

1. Texts:

The required text for this course is: Anita L. Allen, PRIVACY LAW AND SOCIETY, Second Edition. Handouts or on-line material will be assigned or distributed to supplement topics covered.

2. Reading Assignments and Class Preparation:

I will assume you have read and briefed the assigned materials for the specific class and are prepared to discuss the materials. Students are responsible for the notes that follow the assigned cases whether or not the notes are discussed in class.

Significant failures in class preparedness may result in the lowering of your final grade to the <u>next available lowest grade</u>. For example: a final grade of "A" would be lowered to an "A-", "B+" to "B", etc.

3. Attendance:

Class attendance and preparation are mandatory and essential for successful completion of this course. Students may not miss more than twenty percent of the regularly scheduled classes. Any student who misses more than twenty percent of the classes will received a grade of "WF" (withdrawn failing) for the course.

Class will begin promptly at the designated time. Students are expected to arrive to class on time. Significant tardiness to class may be considered an "absence" for purposes of attendance.

4. Grades:

Barring absences in excess of twenty percent of the scheduled classes, your final grade for the semester will be based on the following: (a) class participation (10%); (b) an in-class presentation (25%); (c) final exam (65%).

- A. <u>In-Class Presentation</u>. Each student is expected to present an outline and lead an in-class discussion (approximately 25-30) minutes in length for a specific class. Each presentation should include a survey of the important cases on the subject <u>not</u> in the text, current trends, legislative action, or other important or useful observations or controversies. Handouts are required. Use your oral argument skills. Do not read your presentation. Students may propose topics (subject to their approval by me).
- B. <u>Final Exam</u>. The final exam will be a comprehensive closed note/book essay exam. It will cover reading materials, including student presentation materials, and professor/class generated discussions.
